



Challenges and Opportunities in Implementing the 2014 Primary Education Curriculum in Timor-Leste: A Critical Review of Teacher Perspectives

LITERATURE REVIEW

Two fundamental theoretical perspectives that illuminate teachers' behavior when handling educational change are Fullan's Model of Educational Change combined with Rogers' (2003) Diffusion of Innovations Theory. The change process demands teacher engagement according to the model outlined by Fullan (2006). Continuous professional development stands essential together with system-wide comprehensive support provisions to bring forth effective new curriculum integration. To achieve successful implementation of new curriculums teachers should take active leadership roles throughout implementation while receiving resources and training that helps their professional development. The theory evaluates teacher change processes by studying three key factors including compatibility assessment with new information and perceived advantages against obstacles to useful adaptation which reveals the multiple challenges teachers face regarding educational transformations in their teaching practice. METHODOLOGY

RESULT

The decision to instruct classes in Portuguese has become debatable because most teachers and students do not understand the language which affects their ability to understand the curriculum and teach effectively. Rural educational facilities face multiple barriers because they do not have enough infrastructure, modern teaching tools, or adequate training options for their staff which limits how effectively teachers can use competency-based approaches. The installation of context-sensitive adaptations has become essential because the curriculum runs the risk of being judged as an unresponsive top-down policy with no connection to the real-world experiences of educators and students which deteriorates its targeted influence on educational quality together with learning outcomes.

Teacher involvement is essential for adapting education programs because Timor-Leste has a diverse cultural and linguistic environment. When teachers do not participate meaningfully in curriculum development, they view the curriculum as an externally imposed directive instead of an active collaborative framework, so they might resist implementation while following their own teaching methods instead of the specified pedagogical techniques.

Standardized assessment measures in Timor-Leste remain inadequate because this deficiency prevents effective tracking of educational results for students and curriculum effectiveness. The implementation of assessment constitutes a fundamental component for education because it produces measurable information regarding student development progress as well as teaching program success and curriculum impact (Pereira, 2018). The insufficient standard evaluation protocols across Timor-Leste make it impossible for teachers to give fair feedback to students and gauge student academic growth since the start of their school year. The absence of standardized evaluation procedure guidelines enables teachers to create different assessment strategies and results in analytical differences for student learning assessment. Teacher capabilities to recognise student learning deficits and adapt their teaching approaches as well as offer appropriate intervention to struggling learners are diminished by weak assessment strategies. Educational assessment techniques receive limited training, because of which teachers find it difficult to adopt evaluation approaches that match the competency-based learning targets set by the curriculum. The 2014 curriculum requires established assessment tools that need to provide accurate student performance measurement while enabling teachers to create better methodologies and policy decisions.

DISCUSSION

The finding demonstrates the 2014 curriculum of Timor-Leste fulfills international standards of education while national educational delivery faces various obstacles at present. Deficient teacher training proves to be the principal obstacle that forces instructors to use memorization-based educational methods rather than modern teaching methods. Educational innovation cannot be achieved because Timor-Leste does not have systematic continuous professional development programs for teachers. The professional development framework needs specific core elements to resolve this problem by introducing mentor guidance along with modern instructional methods in application to actual classrooms. Education for teachers in Timor-Leste encounters two core problems: unreliable financial support and insufficient practical elements in their theoretically heavy education model. Professional learning access proves limited in rural districts because of which teacher proficiency gaps become more severe. To develop competent educators the strategy should integrate official training programs with periodic refreshers and peer learning collaboration for achieving theory-based together with practical competencies required for student-centered instruction.

3. Teachers should gain more involvement in developing policy content for schools and educational standards (Almeida, 2020).
4. Educational institutions should implement bilingual education systems that unite Portuguese language schools together with those that use local languages as per the recommendation by Shah et al. (2017).
5. Standardised methods for student progress assessment should be developed, according to Pereira (2018).

ADVANCED RESEARCH
